

Rainbow Koala Standup




- 1. Print out and colour in Rainbow Koala

- 4. Use sticky tape to stick the triangle stand to the back of your Rainbow Koala







Paper Plate Portrait


What you need:

cut out the face parts and stick them on the plates. Add wool and yarn for hair and use Your textas to add more fun features.







Create a Message Stick


Indigenous artists have used desert grasses, wood, fibre and found materials to create objects that convey messages and information in the form of a message stick.



How to create your own message stick or rock:

- Add found objects like leaves, seeds or beads to your message stick to help tell your story.

Cut out the bunyips below and make the stand-ups. You could glue them to cardboard to make them stronger.


Take turns to roll the die and move your bunyip around the board.



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




Bubbly Colours

This simple kitchen science experiment is a fun learning activity. Combining vinegar, bicarb and colouring makes all sorts of oozing, bubbling, colourful reactions.

What you need

- ③ 3 large teaspoons of bicarb soda (or baking powder)
- © white vinegar
- © different food colourings
- © muffin tin
- © teaspoon
- © a table, preferably outside



What to do

Set this experiment up outside if you can, because to make it work properly it has to get a bit messy and bubble over.

Use a different muffin cup for each colour.

We used three colours in this experiment.


Start by half-filling each muffin cup with vinegar.

Put a couple of drops of each colour into the different cups of vinegar in the muffin tin.

Now place one heaped teaspoon of bicarb into each cup and watch the colours fizz!






